**A Timely Warning to Everyone** Strawberry Plants are easy to grow and most garden centres have healthy plants which will readily fruit. Once you have strawberry plants in your garden they will set runners so you can continue to expand your strawberry garden. Some of the unpicked strawberries will also seed and new plants will grow. Gardening is about abundance as nature continues to supply you with an endless supply of both plants and fruit once you have the first plants in your garden.



### So why on earth would anyone buy plants or seeds imported from

**China?** The Product Recall notice in the media makes it quite clear about the risks of importing plant material from China. So be garden wise and protect your health. Buy only seedlings that are locally grown and preferably organic without the added risk of spreading viruses from Asia.

**PRODUCT RECALL:** *Buzzy Strawberry Mini Grow Kits were mistakenly sold through The Warehouse stores nationwide from September when they should have been quarantined and tested for a range of plant viruses. If these seeds are planted and get out into the wider environment, they have the potential to introduce viral diseases to several horticultural crops including strawberries, said MAF response manager Glen Neal.*

*Tui Products imported the kits from China and The Warehouse bought nearly 7000 of them. Of those, 5540 have been recovered and will be destroyed while 1362 remain unaccounted for.*

*Anyone who has bought the kits was asked to return them for a refund, or, if they have been planted they should be dug up and placed inside two plastic bags and put out with household rubbish. They should not be composted or thrown out with green waste.*

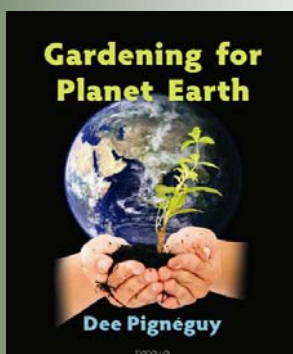

## What's happening in my Garden



The first insect pests are arriving in the garden with the onset of warm weather. Recently upon lifting up some bricks that were sitting on the raised garden beds I found two interesting families. I was surprised to see just how many baby earwigs could fit in the space of a brick as well as the number of eggs that the ants could tend. Mike was ready with his camera and you can see the families in action beginning to scatter to someplace safer. Earwigs are a menace in the garden at the moment shredding the leaves of the climbing beans. But I have discovered a way to get rid of them. I open a can of tuna in oil and make a stirfry out of the contents making sure that I save the oil. Then I put the oil back in the tin, add some water so the oil floats on the top and just after dark take the can and place it under the growing bean plants. In the morning the can is full of dead earwigs, obviously the smell of the oil attracts them and the water drowns them when they crawl in. If you make sure that when opening the can you leave the lid intact, you can just bend it back over the tin to keep any rain from flooding the can. I am about to experiment to see if it works with sardine cans and the residue oil as well.

## GO... Project Gro!!

The success of Project Gro was evident with from the enthusiastic turnout at the end of year (handover) celebration located at Konini Primary School. There were 20 Primary and Secondary schools from the Waitakere area who signed up to be part of the Project which aims to educate and increase participation in the development of organic gardening in schools. Between March and November this year the facilitator Anna Dadson has regularly visited these schools to support them in achieving their gardening goals. Outcomes include the installation of rain tanks, compost heaps, worm farms, building raised garden beds, planting fruit trees, and sowing seeds.

The celebration on Thursday 17th November was a vibrant gathering of teachers and students to farewell Anna and Chris McLean from the project and welcome Darren Millington who will be facilitating the next year thanks to funding from Auckland City Council and EcoMatters.

The afternoon ended with a tour of Konini Primary School led by Del Bailey, caretaker Chris and their gardening club students to proudly showcase their raised garden beds, worm farms and fruit trees. The students excitement in what they have achieved was evident in the salad and pesto they made to nourish the participants of this joyous occasion.
